Have you heard about the new program at P.S. 11? Twenty-six classes have been participating in the P.S. 11 Buddy Reading For one period each Program. week, younger students buddy up with older students and read books that they enjoy together. When the students finish reading they discuss what they have read with their partners. Some classes draw or write responses.

The program is run by Dr. Moore. Although Dr. Moore is often busy helping new teachers, she felt it was important to create the buddy reading program. The reason she wanted to create it was because she was looking for a way to motivate students into reading and enjoying books. "I used to have a buddy reading program in my own classroom when I was a second grade teacher. I remember the students being excited to read to their buddies," she explained.

With that in mind she began to think of ways to introduce the same idea at P.S. 11. When she first mentioned the idea to the teachers she had several classes



sign up. As the word spread around, additional teachers and students became interested and eventually 26 classes joined.

The students have really enjoyed the experience. Fourth grader, Nicole V. who was paired with a first grader says that her partner is really cute and it was a special experience. She felt that the program gave her the chance to practice reading aloud and work on creating questions to help her partner understand the story. Many kindergarteners who worked with 3rd and 4th graders agreed with their buddies that it was a good experience.

Natalie, of Class K-013 said, "My buddy's name is Karen. We read a book about equal and plus." Her classmate, Peyton stated, "I liked when my buddy Stephanie was reading because I liked her books. She read animal books and she read long and short books." Teachers also found the experience beneficial. Although it took a lot of planning and scheduling, 4th grade teacher Ms. Cruz said that her students loved reading to their buddies. 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commuted to P.S. 171 in Astoria and this year 5th and 6th graders have been relocated to P.S. 361 nearby. These changes have allowed P.S. 11 to build a new addition that will duplicate the size of the current building.

In the new annex there will be additional space for specialized classes such as science and art classrooms. According to P.S. 11 Principal, Ms. Pena-Jorge, "Students will be more comfortable." The employees of the cafeteria are also excited since there will be a new and expanded lunchroom with additional space and new appliances.

According to the website for Omni Architects, the organization in charge of planning the addition, an important part of the project includes "the redevelopment of the 40,500 square foot playground, in which terraced outdoor classrooms, play equipment, and a new athletic field will be located." Other improvements include new elevators, improved bathrooms and toilets, a music classroom, and classrooms equipped with state of the art tools. Many of the students are excited about the building but say it is difficult to wait so long. For fifth and sixth grade students it is especially tough because they will have graduated by the time the new building is finished. Michael G., a 5th grader, mentioned, "I am disappointed to be leaving P.S. 11 without having the chance to use the new science lab." and other

rooms. "However", he added, "My sister, Zara (a 4th grader) is so excited to spend her final year at the new P.S. 11 school. I plan on coming back and visiting P.S. 11 when the new school is finished!"

As they wait for the building to go up, some students feel that the construction can be noisy at times. One 1st grader mentioned that one day her teacher had to close the windows because of the noise. However, it doesn't seem to bother most students. According to Sumaitaah, a 4th grader, "I don't really hear the noise because we're on the second floor. People on the bottom floor can probably hear more than us."

The majority of students and staff at P.S. 11 seem to have a positive view of the construction. Mr. Cassulis, a paraprofessional, feels that the construction is going quickly and well. He explained that the main frame is mostly up now so the construction workers will soon be able to work on the interior of the building. This means the noise level will probably soon be quieter.

Ms. Menges, a 4th grade teacher is looking forward to the annex. She stated, "Observing the construction daily has been interesting and a great learning experience. I look forward to our community having a modern facility."
